Prescription Drug Abuse is At Epidemic Proportions

Prescription drug abuse is at epidemic proportions. Today, 2500 12 to 17 year olds will use prescription medication to get high for the first time. One in four high school seniors admit to abusing prescription drugs. Seventy percent say they get them from a friend or relative.

The non-medical use or abuse of prescription drugs is the fastest growing drug problem in the United States and has become a top priority for public health. Abuse of prescription drugs to get high has become increasingly prevalent among teens and young adults.

Because prescription drugs are legal, they are easily accessible, often from a home medicine cabinet. Further, some individuals who misuse prescription drugs, particularly teens, believe these substances are safer than illicit drugs because they are prescribed by a healthcare professional. Past year abuse of prescription pain killers now ranks second—only behind marijuana—as the Nation's most prevalent illegal drug problem.

The health risks associated with prescription drug abuse vary depending on the drug. For example, abuse of opioids, narcotics and pain relievers can slow or stop breathing. The abuse of depressants, including benzodiazepines and other tranquilizers, barbiturates and other sedatives, can result in seizure, respiratory

depression and decreased heart rate. Stimulant abuse can lead to high body temperature, irregular heart rate, cardiovascular system failure and seizure. Inappropriate use of prescription drugs, including use without a prescription or medical supervision, or using in a manner other than exactly as prescribed, can lead to addiction in some cases and even death.

It is important, therefore, that we talk to our kids about the dangers of misusing prescription drugs and to make sure they are not easily accessible. Leaving unused prescription drugs in your medicine cabinet can be very tempting for a young person. We encourage everyone to properly dispose of unused prescriptions and not leave them where they can be used for non-medical reasons by youth or get flushed into our waterways. Holly Woodlands in Holly, MI has partnered with the Village of Holly Police Department and the Holly Area Community Coalition to collect and properly dispose of out-dated and unused prescription drugs. The Holly Police Department is one of the state's many community drop off sites, collecting over 300 pounds per year. Check with your local police department or pharmacy for a site near

Independent Living, What happens in a medical emergency?

Presbyterian Villages' Independent living apartments provide seniors with a maintenance free retirement lifestyle. We offer service amenities at our independent Villages. Each Village offers a different menu of services. What is true across our independent villages is that we do not provide medical services. Apartment living does not provide the oversight that assisted or skilled nursing offers. That is why it is important you and your family understand what happens if a medical emergency should occur.

When you, or someone else, dial 911, local emergency personal will respond. During non-business hours EMS, Police and Fire dept. personnel can enter the building by using the keys left for them in the locked box outside the building. The quickest response comes from dialing 911. Each resident in independent living is also offered an emergency response button at no cost to them. This is an additional way to summon emergency help when you are not within reach a phone. However, you must wear your response button in order for it to be most effective. If your response button is on your dresser and you fall in the bathroom, it won't be of much use.

Our Staff at our independent living Villages <u>are not</u> trained in CPR or other medical procedures. This means they will not be rendering medical care. If they are aware of the emergency and are in the building, they will help facilitate the EMS personnel to get into the building and to you as quickly as possible. They will notify your emergency contact person, if you so request. If they are not in the building they may not know about your situation at all.

Now might be a good time to review your advance directive and place it in an accessible place for the EMS personnel to find. Only medical personnel can interpret your wishes as outlined in your advance directive. If you do not have one and wish assistance with this task, please contact your Village Service coordinator or social worker.

We certainly hope that you never have a medical emergency, but if you do local emergency personnel will respond quickly, with the proper equipment and the necessary knowledge. It is nice to know that we live in communities where local emergency response service is top rate and available. It is sunny and about 50 out right now.... Maybe this horrible winter is almost over! I sure hope so. Now we can just deal with the potholes!

We are getting excited about the Friends and Family campaign! It starts on the 1st of April. The foundation will be matching funds 1 to 1 this year for gifts under \$999 and matching 2:1 for gifts between \$1,000 and \$5,000! A \$1,000 gift will get us \$3,000. The prices I have gotten for a good used bus is about \$18,000 - \$24,000. We want to get something that will hold under 14 passengers (over that would require a CDL) and we don't want to get into that. Residents cannot drive the bus (many have asked). We have to have someone who has passed PVM's criteria and have been approved. A board member, Bill is a registered volunteer or an employee could drive it!

Bill and I visited Myrtle Beach last month and ended up buying a house there! We are going to rent it out until we get ready to retire. We are very excited about it. We took the kids with us and had a great time. The weather was not good but we had fun anyway. We went to a lot of shows and "tourist" traps. We rented a condo on the ocean and it was beautiful! I am sure we are all really tired of this winter! It just feels like it is never going to end! I keep thinking, tomorrow it will be better but not so sure, we might end up with snow until May! Speaking of May, I met with the Boy Scouts and we are going to have our own Cub Pack at the Village of Spring Meadows. If you are interested in having a grand or great grand join the troop, let us know. They will be meeting at SMI community room on Thursdays from 6:30 -8:30. It is for boys under 12 years of age. They also are looking for some volunteers.

Again, speaking of volunteers, we are going to have our cleanup day on Friday and Saturday this year. On Friday the 16th and Saturday the 17th. We have a local church youth group who wants to help us with planting and cleaning up. Mark your calendars and be ready to dig in the dirt! If you can't make the 16th. come on the 17th! We are on our way to Baltimore next week.

We will be speaking about positive aging and YOU!!! It is a great opportunity to speak to over 3,000 people about how amazing aging can be. We are planning some interactive fun.

I was really excited when I got the call from Mr. Glick's foundation. It was great to hear from them and get the offer of helping us get our bus. Now we need to do a lot of work. The most important thing is to just ask.... You might be surprised!

We are saying goodbye to Kayla this week. She has been a huge help to all of us..... Especially me and we will really miss her! I know we all wish her the best, she has promised that she will visit us regularly and will come to some of our big events in the future. She has made many friends at Spring Meadows and I am sure she will keep in contact. Kayla will be walking on April 27th and will have her degree in the fall from Eastern Michigan University with her degree in Social Work. I am really proud that she has decided to dedicate her career to our population. She has decided (after working with you) to work in the field of geriatrics. We all with her the best!
