From the desk of the Executive Director:

The Assisted Living/Nursing project and renovations are still coming along. We have settled on the nursing changes and renovations and we are now working on the assisted living renovations. We hope to be able to re-plan the main resident hall entrance that will include a new café, a full service restaurant, new assisted living dining areas, and larger activities spaces. Along with this the assisted living resident halls themselves with new carpet, paint, furniture, doors, etc. The time table to start is still looking like late October.

As we have been reporting, part of the Villages due diligence is to review our vendor partner contracts every few years. The dining services contract with Unidine is up so at the beginning of April we put the contract out to bid. We had three service providers put together a proposal, Unidine being one of the three. Unidine has served us well for over five years but East Harbor has decided to switch dining services companies and transition back to Morrison's, the provider we had five years ago. A lot has happened with Morrison's over the last five years and we are excited about what they can bring to our community with their services. **September 1st** will be their official start date but a lot of things will be happening over the next two months to prepare for this change. If you have any questions regarding this particular change please do not hesitate to contact me.

Summer is here and there seems like a lot is going on throughout our Village as well as our community. I would encourage you to get involved and have some fun. The annual Village Victory Cup will have happen by the time you read this but I wanted to thank all of the residents who participated as well as the staff who helped our Village to be successful again this year.

MINUTES OF THE RESIDENTS' ASSOCIATION MEETING OF JUNE 14, 2016

The meeting was called to order by President Pete Batts at 1:35PM.

Betsy asked residents to indicate any specific difficulties they were having with the sound system. These problems are to be evaluated by techs from PVM.

Residents present at our meetings for the first time included Oliver and Mary Jacob, and Paula Boglarsky

Pledges to the American and Christian flags were led by Bob Healy.

Our inspirational note was brought by Miriam Woodcock.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as published.

David Miller offered thanks to the staff for the work they put into making the Friends & Family Hoedown a success. He reported that plans for the changes to be made to the licensed areas of the Village (Assisted Living, Health Care) have been sent to the State of Michigan for approval. Meanwhile, the Village is also working with local officials. Initial changes will be mostly cosmetic. They include the creation of a café at the main entrance, and enclosing the Kirk Hall dining area. In addition, 16 private rooms will be added to the TCU (Transitional Care Unit). The plan is to begin construction in the Fall. No residents will be relocated during this time. New apartments and cottage homes will begin construction next Spring. In response to a question regarding how much of the East Harbor property will be used when construction is complete, Mr. Miller said that approximately 40 acres out of a total of 44 will be used. To another question about how soon will uneven concrete in the Village be corrected, he said that this was already in process.

<u>Gladys Stolzenfeld</u> gave the Treasurer's report as follows: General Fund – with no activity, balance remains at \$3,249.00; Petty Cash Fund – with no activity, balance remains at \$93.00; Sugar Bowl – purchase of basketball equipment for practice for the Village Victory Cup - \$87.98, and cash receipts of \$9.28 left a balance of \$78.94.

<u>Nolan</u> announced that Oliver Clark Poloney was born on June 1st. He informed us that because of a food recall of Keebler Honey Grahams due to peanut residue, none would be available for a short time. He presented the Birthday Luncheon menu and the menu for a special Fathers' Day luncheon on the 20th.

<u>Betsy</u> described some interesting and/or fun activities for the month of June including a downtown Detroit walking tour, and going to a Tiger baseball game. Events coming in July include a trip to the Belle Isle Aquarium on the 8th, and a Clinton River cruise on the 11th. She mentioned the possibility of going to some baseball games of the United Shores Baseball League on Friday evenings. She needs to know how many people would be interested in going to any of these games.

<u>Chris</u> reminded us of a pep rally on June 23rd and the Village Victory Cup games on the 24th. <u>Mindy</u> said that those who were providing cookies and brownies for the carnival workers at Bayrama should package them 2/baggie and bring them in on June 20th. We will also be participating in the parade on the 26th.

<u>COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE</u>. Jean Campbell reported that the committee is working on updating the Resident's Handbook.

<u>BUILDING & GROUNDS COMMITTEE.</u> Neil Veneri reported that the committee agreed that the hard work and time spent by the landscaping crews has resulted in a great looking East Harbor campus that we can all be proud of. The committee also discussed the need for some additional signage at the entrance of the Village that would draw the attentions of drivers to the fact that seniors live here. On behalf of the committee, Neil <u>moved that a letter be submitted to East Harbor management requesting that vehicular stop signs be installed directly opposite the main building parking lot at the pedestrian crossing. Whether the sign is permanent or portable in nature would be left to the East Harbor management. The motion was seconded and passed by vote of those in attendance.</u>

<u>NOMINATING COMMITTEE.</u> Jean Campbell presented the slate, and the following were voted into office: President – Pete Batts; Vice President – Elva Daniels; Secretary – Elaine Walton; Treasurer – Gladys Stolzenfeld.

<u>Pete</u> warned everyone that some residents had received phone calls from someone who said they were from the IRS and were asking for information. The IRS assures us that they will never call us on the phone. Pete reminded everyone that there is a suggestion box in the lobby for anyone to use. He thanked Marie Beaulac for her work as chair of the Welcoming Committee, and Annette Gobert for her work as the "Sunshine Lady."

<u>Josie</u> from CareSync reminded us that she coordinates discharges from health Care, and she is available for help in making decisions regarding moves from one area of the Village to another. Her office is at Station 3 in Health Care. CareSync sponsored the ice cream social after this meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:45PM and we gathered in the Activity Room for refreshments.
