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

Biography of Dan Hiltz

Born in Ecourse, Michigan, Dan grew up with an older brother Jack, a graduate of University of Detroit who died at the age of 60, and a sister, Mary Catherine. Their father was a builder. He built a house near West Chicago Blvd in Detroit, on St. Mary Street and Pinehurst for them. He continued to build houses in Detroit near St. Mary's, where houses were condemned in order to widen the streets. His father died at the age of 70.

Dan attended Epiphany School from first to eighth grade, then ninth grade at McKenzie High School, where the discipline made a huge difference. He was at St. Mary of Redford in Detroit from tenth to twelfth grade, where he was introduced to Music and took up the Piano. After graduating from high school, Dan matriculated at Wayne State University where he majored in Piano, earning a B.A. in Music and a B.A. in Science. He also attended the Detroit Conservatory of Music at the Detroit Institute of Art and gave concerts in their Hall.

Raised a Catholic, Dan was married for 19 years to his first wife, but their marriage was annulled. Today he says they never could get along. They had first lived in Detroit, then moved to Plymouth. He met Carol when they were both teachers at a parochial school, Saints Peter and Paul in Detroit, where he taught 3rd grade and she taught 7th grade. They have been married for 30 years!

When he wasn't teaching, Dan frequently subbed in schools. He also taught some 12 to 15 students in their homes. He enjoyed giving piano recitals at the Baldwin Piano House. He also served as organist in churches and directed church choirs.

In the 1980's, Dan and Carol moved to Florida for 14 years. Carol got a teaching job and Dan served as a church organist and directed church choirs. At one church, St. Francis de Sales, Dan was organist for 18 masses a week: one at 6 in the morning, one at 7:15, then at 8:00 a.m., plus various funerals and weddings. He also directed an all-male choir.

They had a lovely three bedroom ranch house in Plymouth, then moved to Florida. When Carol's parents died, they returned to Michigan. After moving so many times, Dan is happy to be settled here at the Village of Westland. They have been here approximately one year.
