## **Westland Police Department Launches New Transparency Dashboard**

The Westland Police Department has announced a partnership with Altovista Technology, a leader in law enforcement intelligence, to provide a new intelligence risk management software program named Arx Alert.

Arx Alert is designed to help prevent problems from occurring within a police agency. The program allows for two configurable user dashboards.

The first is an internal dashboard which will provide data directly to the Chief of Police to help analyze Department risk on factors such as police pursuits, use of force, officer's productivity and officer's behavior patterns.

The second dashboard will provide up to date transparency information about the police department to the public. The public dashboard will show the public crime rates, arrest data, citation data, citizen complaints, officer use of force and training data for all of the department's 81 sworn officers and 25 civilian employees. This program is now completely accessible to the public through the City's website [www.cityofwestland.com](http://www.cityofwestland.com)

Altovista's proven Arx Alert technology seeks to modernize the way we do things through the application of A.I.-driven decision making, to give us greater supervision and effective accountability management of our police agency. We truly believe this partnership will improve community relations and help keep Westland safer.

Recognizing the need to maintain law enforcement transparency with our community, the Westland Police Department is one of the very first agencies in Southeast Michigan to have fully implemented and deployed this type of management and awareness platform.



**Mayor Message Continued:**

The Westland Police Department began the mission back in 2014 when they committed to becoming a nationally accredited agency. This process required a complete police department and administrative policy review by CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies). Since 2014 the department has reviewed, modified and updated every single policy, procedure, process and review system within the Police Department. In 2016 and in every year to follow the department was awarded the gold standard accreditation for law enforcement excellence. This is a standard which has been achieved by less than 5% of all law enforcement agencies throughout the country and by less than 10 agencies within the entire State of Michigan. In 2018 the Westland Police Department took the next step towards this transparency commitment with the implementation of the Body Worn Camera system, becoming one of the first agencies in the State of Michigan to fully implement this technology for every police officer and every patrol car. In July of 2020, the City of Westland hosted the kick-off of a new partnership between Western Wayne County NAACP and the CWW called, Partners for Progress. The partnership serves as a communication forum and listening tour which was created to enhance opportunity for discussion between police agencies and the community members they serve.

**Historic Eloise Site Redevelopment to Revitalize Michigan Avenue Corridor**

The Eloise property in Westland dates back to 1839, where it operated as a poor house before transitioning to medical care. It housed patients with mental illness as well as patients with tuberculosis. It once occupied more than 900 acres in the area with dozens of buildings and thousands of patients. The facility, which last operated at Wayne County General Hospital, halted operations in 1984.

After purchasing the 16-acre historic property, John Hambrick realized a consistent demand to maintain the paranormal elements to the site, which has attracted curiosity for years. Hambrick recently went before the Westland Planning Commission for approval to split the property into five separate parcels to each house a different use.

Hambrick's development plans include a hotel and event space on the property, complete with a 1930s-themed restaurant and bar in the basement, as well as a haunted attraction and a public space serving light fare like coffee and ice cream. The interest in the project has also caught the eye of the Regional Transit Authority. With increased attention being paid to the Michigan Avenue corridor between Detroit and Ann Arbor, the RTA is planning a bus stop nearby along the corridor, a move made after hearing about the project's potential.

The City of Westland is extremely excited to see this project get off the ground as it will bring a new sense of vibrancy and revitalization to the southern portion of our community and will also be a premier destination, helping to put Westland on the map!

## For Your Health and Safety

As if protecting ourselves against COVID-19 and the flu (see our PVM website for a video by our CEO Roger Myers) isn't enough we also need to watch out for mosquito- born diseases. These include Zika virus, West Nile virus, Chikungunya virus denge, and malaria. The best way to prevent diseases spread by mosquitos is to avoid being bitten. The following can help protect you and your family from mosquito bites:

- \*Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) –registered insect repellent. These are all evaluated for safety and effectiveness.
- \*Always follow the product label instructions.
- \*Do not use repellent on babies younger than 2 months of age.
- \*Do not apply insect repellent on a child's hands, eyes, mouth or irritated skin.
- \*Adults- apply repellent on your hands and then apply to a child's face.
- \*Wear protective clothing such as long-sleeved shirts and pants.
- \*Avoid areas where mosquitos can be present.
- \*Maintain window and door screens to keep mosquitos out of buildings. Do not prop open doors.
- \*Get rid of mosquito breeding sites by removing standing water in and around your home.

After working so hard to prevent COVID do not let a case of the flu or a simply mosquito bite be your downfall.

# Mike's Maintenance Tips

## What are you putting down your drains?

### *Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG)*

Grease in sewer pipes causes sewer maintenance problems for property owners and the city. When you use your toilet, shower, washing machine or dishwasher, wastewater leaves your home through pipes that connect to the city sewer system.

Many materials frequently flushed or poured down the drain can harm the pipes that connect to city sewers as well as the city sewer system. Every property owner connected to the city sewer system can be a potential contributor to sewer problems, and a potential victim of those problems.

Putting the wrong things down the drain can damage the sewer system, cause sewer backups in your home, and sewer releases to the environment. Anyone who uses the city sewer system should be responsible for what they flush or pour down drains. Never pour grease in your sink drain and try to use your garbage disposal less.

## Pumpkin Bars with Cream Cheese Frosting



### **BARS**

#### INGREDIENTS:

- 1 16-OUNCE CAN PUMPKIN
- 1 12-OUNCE CAN EVAPORATED MILK
- 1 CUP SUGAR
- 3 EGGS
- 1/2 TEASPOON CINNAMON
- 1 PACKAGE YELLOW CAKE MIX
- 1 CUP CHOPPED WALNUTS
- 1/2 CUP BUTTER OR MARGARINE, MELTED AND COOLED

#### INSTRUCTIONS:

1. PREHEAT OVEN 350 DEGREES.
2. LINE 9X13-INCH PAN WITH WAX PAPER.
3. COMBINE FIRST FIVE INGREDIENTS UNTIL SMOOTH; POUR INTO PAN.
4. SPRINKLE DRY CAKE MIX ON TOP OF MIXTURE AND PAT LIGHTLY.
5. SPRINKLE NUTS ON TOP OF CAKE MIX AND PAT LIGHTLY.
6. POUR BUTTER OVER ALL.
7. BAKE 50 TO 60 MINUTES UNTIL FIRM.
8. LET COOL AND THEN TURN OVER ONTO SERVING PLATTER.
9. REMOVE WAX PAPER

#### INSTRUCTIONS:

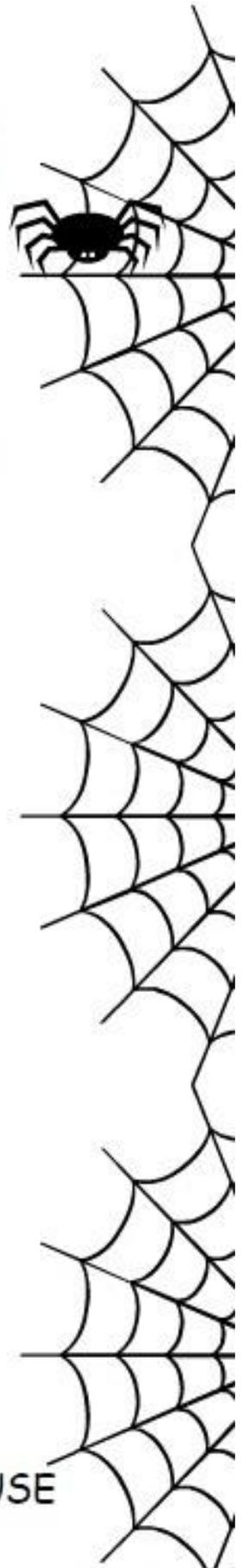
1. IN A LARGE BOWL, BLEND TOPPING INGREDIENTS UNTIL SMOOTH.
