

FROM THE DESK OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR:

The new wing for the nursing center transitional care unit will start soon.

The construction trailer is on site, the State has approved the project, and we are wrapping up the final permits through the local township. It is my estimation that we should start seeing things happening within the last week of January or first week in February.

As for the assisted living renovations we will see work starting in the fitness center located in Barnett Hall as well as the south wing of Barnett Hall. We will also start in Kirk Hall lounge to create a new dinning venue for those living there. Our goal is to work on vacant rooms or common areas first but there may be a need to move some residents to other locations for their safety. There will be safe work zones built in order to protect those living here while this all goes on.

This project is scheduled to be a 15 month process but as areas get finished along the way we will put them back on line so we can move people in. We are excited about the progress happening at our Village but it will come with challenges along the way. We appreciate your prayers and patience throughout this exciting historical step we are taking together.

As for things going on elsewhere within PVM, the Thome Rivertown campus, located downtown off of Jefferson, will be opening and admitting residents to the 21 bed "Green House" Care center sometime early in February. In St. Clair Shores the new independent living senior apartment and memory care facility off of Jefferson and 11 mile road called Lakeshore, is ahead of schedule and has built the first floor of the three story building. They are on track to open this fall. Lastly, PVM has brought on a new community called Trowbridge, located in Southfield Michigan. This facility was recently sold and the new owners hired PVM to manage the campus. PVM now manages 30 communities around the State of Michigan.

Village of East Harbor Resident Association Minutes of Meeting January 10, 2017

Meeting was called to order by president Pete Batts at 1?36.An inspiration reading "Amazing Grace" was read by Marlene Batts. Bob Healy led the pledge to the American flag and the Christian flag. Minutes of the last meeting were distributed and approved.

Gladys Stolzenfeld , Treasurer

Balance December 13, 2016 was 2,856.50 Revenue from the bazaar was \$522.36 from bazaar , \$2400 from candle light dinner and \$1208.00 from raffle ticket sales. \$500 went to staff Christmas fund.

<u>David Miller</u>, Executive Director, reported that plans are moving along for the expansion and renovations. This Thursday final contracts will be awarded to sub-contractors. One permit is still needed from the township. Renovations in AL will begin the end of January. Phase I, the new nursing section, will begin soon after.

Plans begin for Phase 2, the 3 story apartment building, cottage homes and fitness center will go to the Board of Trustees in July. As that gets under way Mr. Miller will meet with the resident advisory committee for input.

Mr. Miller will be setting up Facebook and Twitter accounts to keep residents and others abreast of the progress. He now has additional responsibilities with PVM at corporate, Thomes and the new Lakeshore Community in St. Clair Shores which will be managed by PVM. He has been at Village of East Harbor for 31 years. He will remain as executive director of East Harbor. He expressed his appreciation to all of the residents of East Harbor. Carolyn Martin has been named the new administrator for Assisted Living and Independent Living.

<u>Brian Williams</u>, Morrison Community Living, dining services. They are looking forward to binging on new desserts as well as changing beverage service as requested by residents.

The ice carving and chili cook-of events will be held February 1and 4. The theme for the "Frozen Harbor" is Super Heroes.

Bob Healy reported on the Christmas fund, gifts to all employees.

"With contributions received from residents or their representatives, a monetary gift and a note of appreciation was given to all hourly paid employees of the Village of East Harbor who work more than 20 hours per two-week pay period and began employment prior to October 1, 2016.

As is customary, three factors were involved in determining the amount of each gift: the employee's job classification, the amount of time on the payroll during 2016, and the funds receive as follows.

82 full time employees received \$75, 48 part-time employees ,less than75 hours*, received \$50; 15 part-time employees less than 56 hours*, \$30 and 27 part-time employees less than 40 hours \$20 (per two week pay period). In lieu of tipping, which is prohibited by the Village, a total of \$9,450 was distributed to 162 employees. A note of appreciation was sent to each of the salaried staff. Thank you Elva Daniels, Dorothy Dennis, Bob Healy and Bob Jones for your work on this committee.

<u>Betsy Mianecki</u> Activities Lead. Some upcoming activities were highlighted . Movie <u>La-La</u> <u>Land</u>, Detroit Auto Show, DIA, Anton Art Center, Meadowbook Theater. Wii bowling will be held every Thursday at 11:00 in the activities room.

<u>Chris Gordy</u>, fitness instructor, thanked the residents for the monetary Christmas gifts for all the staff. A new class, Move and Groove, begins on Wednesdays. The 11:00 classes are being held in the Activities Room She is looking for new participants in all the classes. A schedule of all fitness classes is available in the fitness center.

Bob Healy pointed out that it is important to fill out the surveys. Particularly give ideas about how you would like the library to look after renovations.
